NO War 2020

Many of our plans over the past few months had to be dramatically rejigged or cancelled. A key event at the end of May that Conscience Canada sponsored was the World Beyond War (WBW) annual conference to be held in Ottawa. Together with the conference we were working on actions to disrupt CANSEC, North America's biggest weapons expo. And then the world shifted.

CANSEC got cancelled. We had no disruptive street demos. But in the spirit of *Stay Calm and Carry On* the WBW conference went ahead with speakers and listeners participating virtually. You can watch and listen to the NoWar2020 Virtual Conference all on YouTube. There are three

No New Fighter Jets

CC members took action on July 24 to support the National Day of Action to demand that the Canadian federal government cancel the \$19 billion competition for 88 new fighter jets and instead invest in a just recovery and a green new deal. The Day of Action was organized by the Canadian Voice of Women for Peace, Peace Brigades International and WBW. There were rallies at 22 MP and cabinet minister offices across Canada.



Letters were delivered to MPs demanding that the \$19 billion fighter jet procurement be stopped. Our government has plans for not only these 88 fighter jets (19 B \$) but also new combat ships (70 B \$) and armed drones (up to 5 B \$). These billions are just the procurement costs. There will be billions more needed for armaments, maintenance, training and system upgrades for these high-end war fighting machines.

Conversely our government's investment in climate initiatives and the environment is about \$1.8 billion annually with no plans for a substantial increase.

Canada needs a new green economy, grounded in peace and justice for all. This will require an extraordinary investment for the benefit of all Canadians. We do NOT need increased investment in weapons and armaments, in planning and preparing for war.

If I could, I would deliver once and for all the elusive speech that eloquently exposes the truth that war is the result of international leaders exhibiting the moral maturity of children in a sandbox; the speech that would drown warmongers in such a wave of humiliation and shame that they would humbly beg for forgiveness.

If I could, I would pen once and for all the elusive story of peace in such an articulate and attractive way that the knees of the universal soldier would be too weak to bear the implements of murder; the story that so warms the heart of each listener, it would be recited to every child at every bedtime.

If I could, I would rhyme once and for all the elusive poem that perfectly stitches together the immeasurable agony and suffering and heartache of the war zone; the poem that so vividly details the harmony of horror that every reader would instantly proclaim "This must never be!"

If I could, I would paint once and for all the elusive canvas that forever captures the nauseating mix of colour as blind hatred meets blind hatred at the end of a gun barrel; the photograph that makes war so ugly that all its greedy merchants would quickly seek other vocations.

If I could, I would chant once and for all the elusive song of peace; the song that would grip the heart of every listener so intensely that to imagine being the enemy of another human would be repulsive; the song that reminds humanity once and for all that Morning has broken!

Though Peace is elusive, and until now has escaped the speech, the story, the poem, the painting, and the song, we dare not give up the chase. Someday, I believe, humanity will understand that messages of hope for peace and goodwill among nations are not borne by soldiers, or tanks, or fighter jets, or drones, or nuclear weapons. They are borne by mutual respect; the kind that proclaims 'I will treat others as I would like to be treated myself.' May that day come soon!

We hear about defunding the police, the military, NATO, divestment from the military-industrial complex, and diverting tax revenue away from the military towards peace building.

If we really defunded the military what would the result look like? When people talk about defunding and divestment do they mean shutting down every last activity of these organizations? We still need to have a coast guard, emergency response teams, search and rescue. We need to continue to support and care for veterans. However there are some seemingly peaceable activities that bolster sinister objectives. The National Defence Public Relations unit is huge. It conducts military propaganda. It is not innocent. It is responsible for the pervasive them versus us, beware the enemy, might is right, our glorious warrior mentality.

What should be the criteria for what would stay, what should hit the scrap heap?

Let's also be clear. Conflict will remain. A peaceable world will not magically materialize just by not funding the warriors, the police, the armaments industry, the national security spin doctors. We need to be able to support the building of peace where there may be little appetite for it. That will take very disciplined and properly resourced teams of highly trained professional peace builders; makers of peace with the comprehensive skills and highly tuned sensibilities needed to work with communities in crisis that are spiralling down towards armed conflict.

Building peace throughout the world will always be dangerous work. How can peacebuilders be protected – with armed solders? What's the alternative? Precisely how would all the intricate political, organizational and transactional things really work?

These are the questions I believe we all need to be thinking about. Check out <u>Project Save the World</u> headed up by Metta Spencer. Also have a look at WBW's <u>A Global Security System: An Alternative to War.</u> The details of an alternative to our present

mess are being worked out. There are answers to those who resignedly say "Be realistic. It's the way things are. There are no other options."

But here is what I find to be the hardest of questions. Once we have nailed down all the details for a workable, just and peaceful world that



repudiates and demolishes military might-is-right thinking, what must we do, and how far are we willing to go, to bring it about?

Each of us must look within for that answer.
