Here is why TAPS (and we!) are concerned:

Military spending in Canada is poised to skyrocket – the pretext being NATO's arbitrary new commitment that member states commit a staggering 5 percent of GDP on military spending. That represents \$150B annually in Canada.

Canada's projected increase will come at the expense of spending

that working people urgently need: healthcare, education, childcare, environmental protection, housing, employment insurance and public pensions, social assistance, public transit and more.

These considerations are left out of the political discourse, as politicians of all stripes rush to endorse NATO's demands.

# How About Exploring Alternatives Instead of Doubling Down on Disaster?

The Canadian Coalition for Nonviolent Defence is launched!

Surely anyone who's aware of global trends would agree: we face real threats to wellbeing, good governance and freedom/democracy. It can be upsetting and perplexing to see our government embrace doubling down on "defence" spending as a way to strengthen "security".

Writing for the Rideau Institute, board member Robin Collins points out that some of Canada's planned military spending is obviously counterproductive. For instance, regarding the plan to buy F-35 fighter jets, he writes, "Its dependence ... on American manufacturers and designers is concerning. And because of reliability challenges and exorbitant costs, the fighter becomes additionally unattractive..." He also questions the logic of a stealth fighter jet purchase for Canada to begin with. Further, committing to participate in Trump's Golden Dome project would "surrender us to serious strategic risks, persistent technical challenges, and exorbitant costs".

It's obvious that Canada's current government intends to cut spending on other programs, even Pharmacare, for instance, as it increases spending on defence and mega-projects.

Conscience Canada members are not alone in wanting our government to redirect our resources towards programmes that would, we're sure, be more useful in facing threats to wellbeing and

security. When we expressed an interest in pursuing unarmed civilian defence/engagement instead of relying on military defence, someone passed that note on to Isaiah Ritzmann, who was keen to work on this approach. Isaiah has proven to be an excellent facilitator and there is a now a working group of people from across the country. Our name, at least for now, is the Canadian Coalition for Nonviolent Defence/Coalition canadienne pour la défense nonviolente (CCND/CCDN).

We are eager to find members of government and other high-profile citizens who are interested to discuss this approach. For instance, Senator Yuen Pau Woo

graciously accepted our invitation for a zoom meeting that proved to be engaging and thought-provoking for all concerned. Maybe some CC members would like to help this effort by organizing kitchen table or circle discussions in their community. We can help provide background information and ideas to help frame the discussion.

Clearly, we also need to encourage our media outlets to cover the defence spending increase more thoughtfully. It seems to me that the increased spending is being covered as if there were no viable alternatives, as if other perspectives weren't worth mentioning. This unquestioning stance concerns most coverage of plans for "nation-building" investments, many of which are, arguably, very violent in terms of their implementation and impact.


## **Worth Repeating**

## In the face of bad news, some good

Ok, much of our news is not just bad; it's unbearable. A famine and ongoing war of vengeance imposed on Palestinians, particularly those in Gaza, and genocidal violence in Sudan and other places, the nation that prided itself on being the "leader of the free world" using masked "police" to round up people and ship them off to prisons that resemble concentration camps as the rule of law is gutted. Meanwhile our Canadian government is poised to bring in Bill C-2, which seems to head Canada in the same direction as the US government is heading; it would further erode rights for refugees and immigrants and enable dangerous levels of surveillance. (If you are concerned about Bill C-2, please sign this petition by Oct. 28 and let your MP know.)

Our best leaders urge us never to lose the kind of hope that keeps us doing what needs to be done, no matter what.

It can help to know our efforts *can* make a real difference, no matter how dire the situation is. Let's savour a few examples:

As Sojourners Magazine documented, in 2023 the world was holding its breath as Russia invaded Zaporizhzhia, home to Europe's largest nuclear plant. Would there be another Chernobyl, only even more deadly?

Dr. John Reuwer, a disarmament leader and veteran of unarmed civilian peace teams, knew the International Atomic Energy inspectors being sent in to help prevent disaster would need help. He started the Zaporizhzhia Protection Project. Reuwer explained that people in the neighbouring town of Marhanets "said the Russians would never allow us to bring unarmed protection to the plant. I said, 'Do you mean it would take a miracle?' 'Yeah,' they said. 'Okay,' I said. 'Have we had any other miracles?' "

No doubt he was referring to "one of the most amazing stories in nonviolence history" of how unarmed Ukrainian civilians held off Russian soldiers for a week, with no casualties, when the Russians wanted to invade Enerhodar, where the Zaporizhzhia plant is situated.

As the Metta Center for Nonviolence sums it up: "The danger posed by the power plant is enormous – even a small misstep, one missile misfired, could lead to a global disaster. ...The use of nonviolent tactics –

like unarmed civilian protection, used by the Zaporizhzhya Protection Project – is a move to a higher level of consciousness. And it is one that has been proven, time and again, to work."

CC board member Linda Thyer learned of this story through a World Beyond War conference and was successful in getting John to join a CAPE (Can. Assoc. of Physicians for the Environment) conference.

Charles Small, another CC board member, has been supporting Independent Jewish Voices, which succeeded in getting Revenue Canada to remove the Jewish National Fund from a list of eligible charities, as it has been funding illegal takeover of Palestinian land. His efforts to convince mainstream Jewish organizations that their unwavering support for Israeli government actions will likely further the growth of antisemitism, are much needed.

When our spirits flag, it can help to remember the people we encouraged, the insights and ideas we shared, the things we built, knowing they all make a difference.
